Routine Business

- 1. The District received its first assessment distribution from the Palm Beach County Tax Collector on November 7, 2016, totaling \$154,831.83.
- 2. We continue to work on the year end close in preparation of the audits commencement in January.
- 3. One of the requirements under our financing agreements is to provide the lender with certain continuing disclosures. In September we complied with a Regions Bank requirement by sending them a report (in Excel) on the assessment collection and land use profile of the District for the past fiscal year. That report is attached. Of note is that there were 7,299 parcels assessed with 7,093 (97.18%) collected within the legal time period. There were 180 (2.47%) parcels which were collected subsequently mostly through the sale of tax certificates and there were 26 (.36%) that were uncollected. While the uncollected parcels were higher than historical, it is still not alarming. When we drill down on the uncollected parcels, 7 of them are water management and other infrastructure tracts within the Jupiter Farms Community Shopping Center.
- 4. Please see the attached memo concerning establishing a Board policy accepting prepayments of debt assessments.
- 5. Continuing our practice of prior years we are not including budget to actual statements in this report. Since the October transactions are largely items accrued in our prior year report, the budget reflects only minor expenditures. We will provide the Board with these statements through November at the next meeting.

Chapter 298 provides that a landowner may prepay a new capital assessment prior to the financing of the improvements.

For many years the District's practice was to not accept prepayment of these assessments once the initial period had been passed and the financing secured. This changed with the original financing of the PBCE Water Distribution System in 2006 because a special series of bonds was created (the Series B bonds) for the financing of the Town Of Jupiter's (TOJ) requirement that 50% of the reserved connection fees be paid in advance. That agreement also provided that SIRWCD would be reimbursed by the TOJ for each connection made. The Series B bonds allowed for their prepayment with no penalty so that the reimbursements could be aggregated and used to pay down this debt. Because of this feature it made sense that should a landowner wish to prepay the assessment, we could accept it and add it to those funds received from the TOJ. This would increase the amount of bonds that could be called thereby benefiting all of the parcels in the in PBCE. The amount of the prepayment required would be the prorated unpaid principal on the parcel.

The other financings of the District also have a provision for allowing prepayment of a portion of the debt. However, the amount required for the prepayment is the total debt service (i.e. the unpaid principal plus the annual interest required to maturity). Thus a prepayment of this type is not a good financial choice, and was a rare occurrence.

In recent years, when there was a buyers' market in Real Estate, many buyers began requiring the seller to pay off all debt assessments. Since we had been accepting prepayments for the Series B bonds we began accepting prepayments of other debt on a parcel.

The incidence of these transactions has been increasing requiring office staff and Treasurer's time (frequently on an expedited basis). Once the prepayment is accepted new codes have to be added to the assessment roll and revisions must be made to the underlying fund budget.

Since these transactions are essentially between the buyer and the seller these they can be handled by making an adjustment on the closing statement without the District's involvement.

If the Board were to establish a policy whereby the District would not be accepting prepayments (after the initial period required by Chapter 298), we would continue to provide the relevant information as requested. That information would be on a per parcel basis: the outstanding principal, the remaining debt service, the remaining term and the estimated annual assessment for the remaining term. Most of this information is already prepared annually for the office staff.

Should this policy be adopted, we could inform the landowners of the change via the newsletter and the District's website.

The following is a summary of activities and communications that were of significance during the months of October and November. Updated information is presented in **bold**:

I. CURRENT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER DISTRICT PROJECTS

- A. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed February 6, 2015 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by March 12, 2015. On March 26, 2015, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners who voted on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately 3.8 miles):
 - 64th Way N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 67th Trail N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 68th Drive N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 74th Avenue N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
 - 75th Way N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 77th Trail N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 78th Drive N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
 - 81st Terrace N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 149th Place between 69th Drive N. and 64th Way N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 79th Terrace N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. to East End

At the May 2015 meeting, staff was directed to prepare the 18th Plan of Improvement. The public hearing for the Plan of Improvement was held on August 20, 2015. Staff was then directed to prepare the Engineer's Report. The public hearing for the Engineer's Report was held at the October 15, 2015 meeting. At the October 15, 2015 meeting, staff was directed to begin survey and design services for the approved 18th Plan of Improvement.

On May 20, 2016, an advertisement for bid on the project was published in the Palm Beach Post. Potential bidders picked up bid documents on May 27, 2016 with bids due on June 27, 2016.

After negotiating with the lower bidder, Hardrives, Inc, contract documents were executed and a notice to proceed was issued for October 1, 2016. Construction has started and staff is prepared to update the board at this month's meeting.

B. Staff has received requests for petitions from landowners for roadway improvement projects. Currently, the District has received petitions that have met the current policy of obtaining signatures from the majority (50% plus 1) of the landowners within the project area to apply asphalt on certain roadways within the District.

Pursuant to Board direction, staff is preparing a referendum for the landowner proposed project. The landowners on the following roadways petitioned to distribute a referendum for asphalt (approximately 3.6 miles):

- 70th Trail N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
- 76th Trail N. between 160th Lane N. and 162nd Court N.
- 76th Trail N. between 163rd Court N. and 165th Street N.
- 78th Drive N. between 165th Street N. and 167th Court N.
- 93rd Lane N. between 155th Road N. and 159th Court N.
- 154th Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 81st Terrace N.
- 159th Court N. between 79th Terrace N. and 84th Avenue N.
- 159th Court N. between 78th Drive N. and 79th Terrace N.
- 160th Street N. between 72nd Drive N. and 75th Avenue N. and 72nd Drive N. from 160th Street N. to 160th Lane N.
- 175th Road N. between Jupiter Farms Road and West End
- 179th Court N. between Mellen Lane N. and Alexander Run

Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project which was mailed October 17, 2016 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by December 9, 2016. Staff is prepared to discuss at this board's meeting.

II. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

- A. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Steering Committee met on September 21, 2016 and October 19, 2016 to discuss the budget report, the sixth (6th) year annual reports of the program, the Reasonable Assurance Plan (RAP) for the Loxahatchee River, storm events sampling cost, and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Map Implementation Schedule. The next meeting is scheduled for November 16, 2016.
- B. Staff has been actively involved in a sub team for modeling for the Loxahatchee River Water Restoration Plan. Staff has been meeting with the Army Corp of Engineers and South Florida Water Management District to clarify the operational protocols of South Indian River Water Management District. Efforts on the sub team include confirming assumptions in the model and aiding in the planning effort.

In addition, a meeting was held March 30, 2016 of the Project Delivery Team. At this meeting the group reviewed 13 project alternatives and ranked the projects to reduce the number of projects that will undergo further analysis. A subsequent meeting was

held on April 5, 2016 to reduce the number of alternatives to 5 alternatives. The alternatives include a variety of projects to help the Loxahatchee River to meet its goals for minimum flow and restoration.

Staff has been attending the Engineering and Modeling Task subcommittee meetings to ensure that the operational protocols are being implemented for the District.

- C. Staff attended the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council meeting on March 28, 2016. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) presented possible TMDLs within certain water body identification (WBID) areas and the process of a Reasonable Assurance plan in lieu of a TMDL and Basin Area Management Plan (BMAP) for the impaired WBIDs. As a result of this meeting, at the June 27, 2016 meeting, the council discussed plans to move forward with a Reasonable Assurance (RA) plan with the assistance of FDEP. Meetings have been held monthly to discuss the RA plan. The last meetings were September 26, 2016 and October 24, 2016 to discuss the basin delineations, water quality, and a draft RA plan.
- D. Staff attended a meeting on October 19, 2016 with the Jupiter Farms Shopping Center Property Owner's Association (POA) and a representative of the Calvary Chapel Church of Jupiter. The meeting was held due to an item shown on their site plan concerning an equestrian access across Canal 1. The POA requested guidance from SIRWCD on this item. Staff will be prepared to update the board on this item at this month's meeting.
- E. Staff continues to monitor and participate in the activities of the Loxahatchee River Ecosystem Management Committee, the Loxahatchee River Initiative, and the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council.
- F. We continue to receive, review, and comment on various permit applications for projects to be constructed within the District.
- G. We continue to provide engineering assistance to the General Manager, as needed, on operation and maintenance items, as well as landowner requests, utility requests, and inquiries from other governmental entities on issues that involve engineering support.

Preamble to Road Paving Policy

After completing the 18th Plan of Improvement and working on the 19th Plan of Improvement, I have come to the conclusion that these Plans of Improvements are taking too much Staff time and Board Meeting time. Our District needs to refocus on water control especially our secondary water control system. As time progresses, we need to ensure our quality of surface water runoff remains in the acceptable levels as it has in the past. We need to stop spending so much energy and time concerning whether a dirt road gets paved or it remains a dirt road.

Under the proposed policy, all funds to cover the costs will be required prior to paving and landowners not wanting the improvement are not required nor can be forced to pay for the improvement. There are other Special Districts that use this policy for paving.

SIRWCD - Enhanced Stabilization (Paving) Policy

I. PURPOSE

To create a systematic procedure for South Indian River Water Control District's Landowners to apply for road surface upgrades on "District Roads" (no more than ½ mile in length).

II. PROCEDURE

The South Indian River Water Control District Board of Supervisors hereby establishes the following:

- 1. A simple majority or more of the property owners must agree to have the road paved.
- 2. No roadway will be considered for paving unless the drainage swales and road base are considered suitable for paving by the District's Operations Manager and Engineer.
- 3. Paving shall be in accordance with the design and specifications approved by the District Engineer.
- 4. Should a roadway need additional work, the owners may:
 - a. Pay the additional costs of these improvements in addition to the paving.
 - b. Wait until the roadway has been completed as part of the District's road operations and maintenance program approved by the Board of Supervisors.
- 5. The Board of Supervisors approves the Petition after Staff review.
- 6. The District shall receive 100% of the cost of paving (grading, asphalt, spreading, rolling, etc.) in advance of the work being undertaken.

III. ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

- 1. The District shall consider no more than five (5) petitions for paving within a Fiscal Year. This limitation is imposed based on current Staffing and workload considerations. Additionally, petitions may not be considered until the following Fiscal Year due to work schedules.
- 2. There will be no financing from the District.
- 3. Petitions are only for one road.
- 4. The funds will be held in escrow in a noninterest bearing account until all costs are collected. If all funds are not collected within a year of approval, funds will be returned less administrative/staff fees incurred by the District.
- 5. Those landowners who do not want the improvement are not required nor can be forced to provide funds.
- 6. District Roads do not qualify for traffic calming devices after paving.
- 7. Paving a road does not abandon or reduce the annual road maintenance assessment on landowner's Non Ad Valorem taxes.

Subject Engineer's Report for January 2017

Board Meeting Date January 26, 2017

The following is a summary of activities and communications that were of significance during the month of January. Updated information is presented in **bold**:

I. CURRENT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER DISTRICT PROJECTS

- A. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed February 6, 2015 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by March 12, 2015. On March 26, 2015, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners who voted on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately 3.8 miles):
 - 64th Way N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 67th Trail N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 68th Drive N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 74th Avenue N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
 - 75th Way N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 77th Trail N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 78th Drive N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
 - 81st Terrace N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 149th Place between 69th Drive N. and 64th Way N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 79th Terrace N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. to East End

At the May 2015 meeting, staff was directed to prepare the 18th Plan of Improvement. The public hearing for the Plan of Improvement was held on August 20, 2015. Staff was then directed to prepare the Engineer's Report. The public hearing for the Engineer's Report was held at the October 15, 2015 meeting. At the October 15, 2015 meeting, staff was directed to begin survey and design services for the approved 18th Plan of Improvement.

On May 20, 2016, an advertisement for bid on the project was published in the Palm Beach Post. Potential bidders picked up bid documents on May 27, 2016 with bids due on June 27, 2016.

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After negotiating with the lower bidder, Hardrives, Inc, contract documents were executed and a notice to proceed was issued for October 1, 2016. Construction has started and staff is prepared to update the board at this month's meeting.

B. Staff has received requests for petitions from landowners for roadway improvement projects. Currently, the District has received petitions that have met the current policy of obtaining signatures from the majority (50% plus 1) of the landowners within the project area to apply asphalt on certain roadways within the District.

Pursuant to Board direction, staff is preparing a referendum for the landowner proposed project. The landowners on the following roadways petitioned to distribute a referendum for asphalt (approximately 3.6 miles):

- 70th Trail N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
- 76th Trail N. between 160th Lane N. and 162nd Court N.
- 76th Trail N. between 163rd Court N. and 165th Street N.
- 78th Drive N. between 165th Street N. and 167th Court N.
- 93rd Lane N. between 155th Road N. and 159th Court N.
- 154th Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 81st Terrace N.
- 159th Court N. between 79th Terrace N. and 84th Avenue N.
- 159th Court N. between 78th Drive N. and 79th Terrace N.
- 160th Street N. between 72nd Drive N. and 75th Avenue N. and 72nd Drive N. from 160th Street N. to 160th Lane N.
- 175th Road N. between Jupiter Farms Road and West End
- 179th Court N. between Mellen Lane N. and Alexander Run

Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project which was mailed October 17, 2016 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by December 9, 2016.

Staff received the results from the Palm Beach County Supervisor of Election on December 14, 2016. Staff is prepared to discuss these results at this board's meeting and is prepared to request a motion to proceed with the 19th Plan of Improvements.

II. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

- A. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Steering Committee met on January 18, 2017. The subject of the meeting was on the Fiscal Year 2017 and 2018 budget. In addition, staff met to review the District's practices of monitoring illicit discharges and monitoring construction activities within the District.
- B. Staff has been actively involved in a sub team for modeling for the Loxahatchee River Water Restoration Plan. Staff has been meeting with the Army Corp of Engineers and South Florida Water Management District to clarify the operational protocols of South Indian River Water Management District. Efforts on the sub team include confirming assumptions in the model and aiding in the planning effort.

In addition, a meeting was held March 30, 2016 of the Project Delivery Team. At this meeting the group reviewed 13 project alternatives and ranked the projects to reduce

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the number of projects that will undergo further analysis. A subsequent meeting was held on April 5, 2016 to reduce the number of alternatives to 5 alternatives. The alternatives include a variety of projects to help the Loxahatchee River to meet its goals for minimum flow and restoration.

Staff has been attending the Engineering and Modeling Task subcommittee meetings to ensure that the operational protocols are being implemented for the District.

- C. Staff attended the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council meeting on March 28, 2016. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) presented possible TMDLs within certain water body identification (WBID) areas and the process of a Reasonable Assurance plan in lieu of a TMDL and Basin Area Management Plan (BMAP) for the impaired WBIDs. As a result of this meeting, at the June 27, 2016 meeting, the council discussed plans to move forward with a Reasonable Assurance (RA) plan with the assistance of FDEP. Meetings have been held monthly to discuss the RA plan. The last meetings were September 26, 2016 and October 24, 2016 to discuss the basin delineations, water quality, and a draft RA plan. A special meeting was held on December 2, 2016 to discuss the RA boundaries on the project. Staff attended to educate the committee on the drainage system of the District. The next meeting is planned for January 30, 2017.
- D. Staff continues to monitor and participate in the activities of the Loxahatchee River Ecosystem Management Committee, the Loxahatchee River Initiative, and the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council.
- E. We continue to receive, review, and comment on various permit applications for projects to be constructed within the District.
- F. We continue to provide engineering assistance to the General Manager, as needed, on operation and maintenance items, as well as landowner requests, utility requests, and inquiries from other governmental entities on issues that involve engineering support.

- 5. Crews continue to replace District drainage culverts at various locations.
- 6. Drainage swales continue to be re-contoured throughout the District.
- 7. Crews continue to clear drainage outfalls in Palm Beach Country Estates.

The following is a summary of activities and communications that were of significance during the month of February. Updated information is presented in **bold**:

I. CURRENT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER DISTRICT PROJECTS

- A. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed February 6, 2015 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by March 12, 2015. On March 26, 2015, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners who voted on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately 3.8 miles):
 - · 64th Way N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 67th Trail N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 68th Drive N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - · 74th Avenue N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
 - 75th Way N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 77th Trail N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - 78th Drive N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
 - 81st Terrace N. between 150th Court N. and 154th Court N.
 - · 149th Place between 69th Drive N. and 64th Way N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 79th Terrace N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. to East End

At the May 2015 meeting, staff was directed to prepare the 18th Plan of Improvement. The public hearing for the Plan of Improvement was held on August 20, 2015. Staff was then directed to prepare the Engineer's Report. The public hearing for the Engineer's Report was held at the October 15, 2015 meeting. At the October 15, 2015 meeting, staff was directed to begin survey and design services for the approved 18th Plan of Improvement.

On May 20, 2016, an advertisement for bid on the project was published in the Palm Beach Post. Potential bidders picked up bid documents on May 27, 2016 with bids due on June 27, 2016.

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After negotiating with the lower bidder, Hardrives, Inc, contract documents were executed and a notice to proceed was issued for October 1, 2016. Construction has started and staff is prepared to update the board at this month's meeting.

B. Staff has received requests for petitions from landowners for roadway improvement projects. Currently, the District has received petitions that have met the current policy of obtaining signatures from the majority (50% plus 1) of the landowners within the project area to apply asphalt on certain roadways within the District.

Pursuant to Board direction, staff is preparing a referendum for the landowner proposed project. The landowners on the following roadways petitioned to distribute a referendum for asphalt (approximately 3.6 miles):

- 70th Trail N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
- 76th Trail N. between 160th Lane N. and 162nd Court N.
- 76th Trail N. between 163rd Court N. and 165th Street N.
- 78th Drive N. between 165th Street N. and 167th Court N.
- 93rd Lane N. between 155th Road N. and 159th Court N.
- 154th Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 81st Terrace N.
- 159th Court N. between 79th Terrace N. and 84th Avenue N.
- 159th Court N. between 78th Drive N. and 79th Terrace N.
- 160th Street N. between 72nd Drive N. and 75th Avenue N. and 72nd Drive N. from 160th Street N. to 160th Lane N.
- 175th Road N. between Jupiter Farms Road and West End
- 179th Court N. between Mellen Lane N. and Alexander Run

Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project which was mailed October 17, 2016 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by December 9, 2016.

Staff received the results from the Palm Beach County Supervisor of Election on December 14, 2016. Staff is prepared to discuss these results at this board's meeting and is prepared to request a motion to proceed with the 19th Plan of Improvements.

II. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

- A. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Steering Committee met on January 18, 2017. The subject of the meeting was on the Fiscal Year 2017 and 2018 budget. In addition, staff met to review the District's practices of monitoring illicit discharges and monitoring construction activities within the District. The next Steering Committee Meeting is scheduled for March 15, 2017.
- B. Staff has been actively involved in a sub team for modeling for the Loxahatchee River Water Restoration Plan. Staff has been meeting with the Army Corp of Engineers (ACOE) and South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) to clarify the operational protocols of South Indian River Water Management District. Efforts on the sub team include confirming assumptions in the model and aiding in the planning effort.

In addition, a meeting was held March 30, 2016 of the Project Delivery Team. At this meeting the group reviewed 13 project alternatives and ranked the projects to reduce the number of projects that will undergo further analysis. A subsequent meeting was held on April 5, 2016 to reduce the number of alternatives to 5 alternatives. The alternatives include a variety of projects to help the Loxahatchee River to meet its goals for minimum flow and restoration.

Staff has been attending the Engineering and Modeling Task subcommittee meetings to ensure that the operational protocols are being implemented for the District. SFWMD and the ACOE have been working on updating the model with the different scenarios and updating the cost estimates of proposed regional projects for the cost feasibility analysis. These updates are being prepared for the Project Implementation Report (PIR) as part of the ACOE process.

C. Staff attended the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council meeting on March 28, 2016. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) presented possible TMDLs within certain water body identification (WBID) areas and the process of a Reasonable Assurance plan in lieu of a TMDL and Basin Area Management Plan (BMAP) for the impaired WBIDs. As a result of this meeting, at the June 27, 2016 meeting, the council discussed plans to move forward with a Reasonable Assurance (RA) plan with the assistance of FDEP. Meetings have been held monthly to discuss the RA plan. The last meetings were September 26, 2016 and October 24, 2016 to discuss the basin delineations, water quality, and a draft RA plan. A special meeting was held on December 2, 2016 to discuss the RA boundaries on the project. Staff attended to educate the committee on the drainage system of the District.

Staff attended the January 30, 2017 meeting. This meeting discussed the WBID boundary changes, the water quality monitoring plan, and the status of the RA Plan.

- D. Staff also attended the Loxahatchee River Preservation Initiative meeting on February 6, 2017. This meeting discussed the project updates for the Fiscal Year 2018 Legislative Request and the Jupiter Farms Elementary Force Main Project Update.
- E. Staff continues to monitor and participate in the activities of the Loxahatchee River Ecosystem Management Committee, the Loxahatchee River Initiative, and the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council.
- F. We continue to receive, review, and comment on various permit applications for projects to be constructed within the District.
- G. We continue to provide engineering assistance to the General Manager, as needed, on operation and maintenance items, as well as landowner requests, utility requests, and inquiries from other governmental entities on issues that involve engineering support.

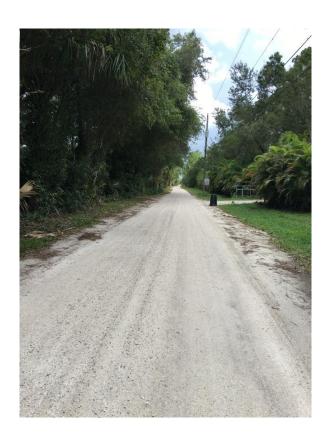

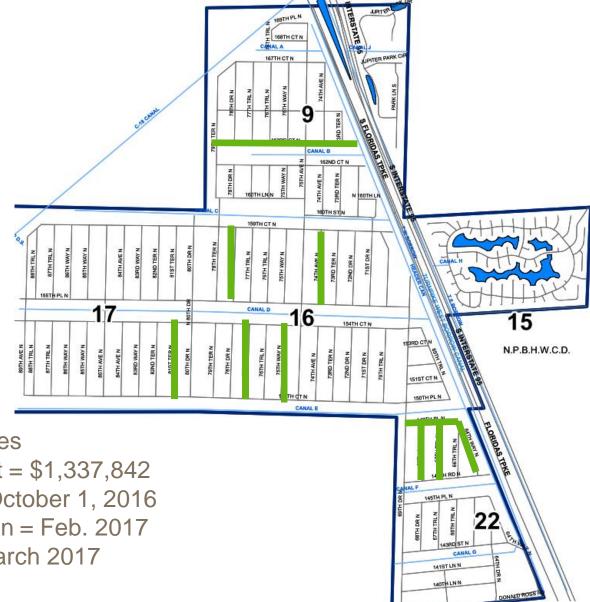

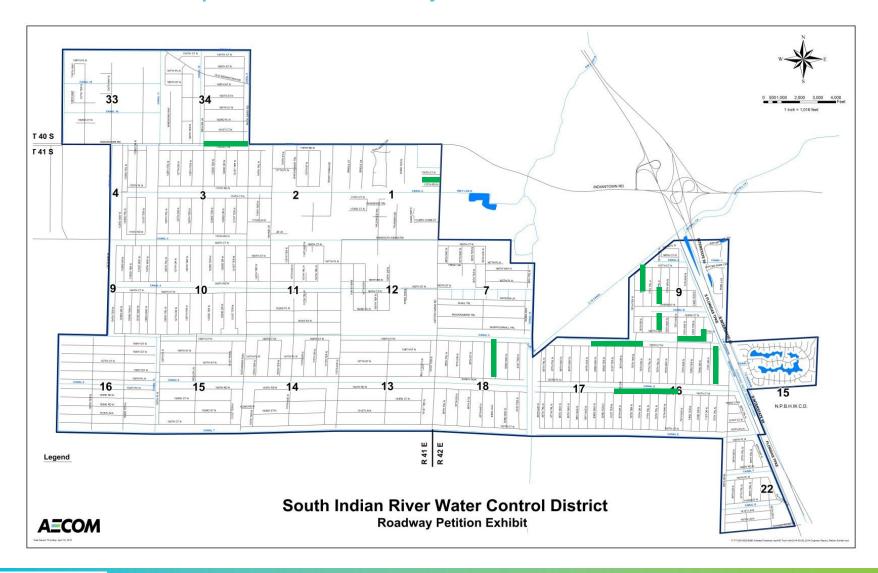

A. Proposed Road Paving Policy

SIRWCD - Enhanced Stabilization (Paving) Policy

I. PURPOSE

To create a systematic procedure for South Indian River Water Control District's Landowners to apply for road surface upgrades on "District Roads" (no more than ½ mile in length).

II. PROCEDURE

The South Indian River Water Control District Board of Supervisors hereby establishes the following:

- 1. A simple majority or more of the property owners must agree to have the road paved.
- 2. No roadway will be considered for paving unless the drainage swales and road base are considered suitable for paving by the District's Operations Manager and Engineer.
- 3. Paving shall be in accordance with the design and specifications approved by the District Engineer.
- 4. Should a roadway need additional work, the owners may:
 - a. Pay the additional costs of these improvements in addition to the paving.
 - Wait until the roadway has been completed as part of the District's road operations and maintenance program approved by the Board of Supervisors.
- 5. The Board of Supervisors approves the Petition after Staff review.
- 6. The District shall receive 100% of the cost of paving (grading, asphalt, spreading, rolling, etc.) in advance of the work being undertaken.



Item 8: Old Business (cont.)

III. ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

- The District shall consider no more than five (5) petitions for paving within a Fiscal Year. This limitation is imposed based on current Staffing and workload considerations. Additionally, petitions may not be considered until the following Fiscal Year due to work schedules.
- 2. There will be no financing from the District.
- 3. Petitions are only for one road.
- 4. The funds will be held in escrow in a noninterest bearing account until all costs are collected. If all funds are not collected within a year of approval, funds will be returned less administrative/staff fees incurred by the District.
- Those landowners who do not want the improvement are not required nor can be forced to provide funds.
- 6. District Roads do not qualify for traffic calming devices after paving.
- 7. Paving a road does not abandon or reduce the annual road maintenance assessment on landowner's Non Ad Valorem taxes.

MINUTES OF THE WORKSHOP MEETING OF THE SOUTH INDIAN RIVER WATER CONTROL DISTRICT HELD ON MARCH 9, 2017

The workshop meeting of the South Indian River Water Control District was held on March 9, 2017, at 6:00 p.m. at the District WorkCenter, 15600 Jupiter Farms Road, Jupiter, Florida. Present were Supervisors Steve Hinkle, Tom Powell, Michael Ryan, John Meyer and Michael Howard. Also present were Amy Eason, engineer; William Capko, attorney; Mike Dillon, manager of operations; Donna DeNinno, public information; and Jane Woodard, secretary. Three landowners were also present.

Mr. Hinkle called the meeting to order and the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag was given. The purpose of the workshop was to discuss the proposed enhanced stabilization policies.

Mr. Hinkle stated there were three separate policies to consider. Landowners could go to the County for funding, bypassing SIRWCD. Landowners could finance and pay for the improvements themselves without going through a referendum if there is a petition from 51% of the landowners. The landowners could continue with SIRWCD providing financing. Mr. Hinkle stated he initiated his proposal because financing as becoming a problem for the District, and there was too much time spent in meetings talking about paving. If the landowners handled the financing and paving themselves, the District could concentrate on only water control. Mr. Powell stated financing has always been an issue but the treasurer manages to work it out. He pointed out that the majority of the time spent at meetings discussing paving has been about changing policies and procedures. Paving in the District has been accomplished since 1982 with little or no discussion because the landowners handled their petitions, a referendum was conducted, and then the Board made a final decision. He noted that the bar has now been set so high, there probably will not be more paving requested in the District.

Mr. Meyer stated there have been complaints from landowners on both sides of the issue. There needs to be a process that gets the District out of the paving business so it can concentrate on water control.

Mr. Howard stated the policy originally proposed virtually does away with paving because landowners will not be able to afford to pay for it up front. The provision for a simple majority decision does not meet the standard, as the policy currently in place requires 50% plus one of the affected landowners. The proposal appears to come directly from Indian Trails and does not deal with specific issues in SIRWCD. He noted that the original proposed policy did not get a second when presented at the previous Board meeting.

Mr. Ryan stated the original proposal would not allow a minority of landowners to make decisions affecting the others. Any paving policy would not be fair unless equal rights and solutions are given to those landowners who want to keep dirt roads. He noted Mr. Howard's proposal does not stop the threat of landowners coming back multiple times to vote for paving. If the District does not provide financing, landowners are then responsible for paying for paving themselves. He would like to find a way to keep dirt roads and not force residents out of their homes because of a hardship caused by assessments on their property.

Mr. Meyer believed most landowners would vote against a petition so they do not have to pay, forcing those who really want the paving to pay for the entire road.

Mr. Powell stated the original proposal is an extreme position. A referendum would be very difficult to pass. Mr. Howard's proposal listens to all the landowners and appears to be a good compromise. The Board should not let a small percentage of hardship cases drive the solution.

Mr. Hinkle noted that every monthly engineering report has had paving issues that require discussion.

Mr. Meyer suggested an application process requiring a fee when a petition is initiated. The Board could also establish a paving committee consisting of a supervisor and staff member who would meet outside of the regular Board meetings. Mr. Capko confirmed it would be legal to have an application fee.

Mr. Powell noted that once a policy is established, the Board should quit micromanaging the project.

Mr. Howard noted if the Board believes the voting has been bullied, it can decide not to include that road in the paving plan. He stated his proposal creates a timeline for the Board and staff, and requires a super-majority. If the landowners are forced to go to the County for paving, it will construct a street with swales and SIRWCD will have no control over that. Turning over drainage swales to another agency inhibits the job SIRWCD can do for the landowners. Mr. Dillon noted there have been maintenance issues with County culverts in the past. County standards always leave issues with swale contouring, etc.

Mr. Hinkle stated he did not like the "per foot" provision in Mr. Howard's proposal. Mr. Howard explained this gives the Board flexibility. Mr. Powell stated the District is required to assess on a per parcel basis. Mr. Meyer suggested assessments could be based on frontage and not by parcel. Mr. Hinkle noted that some landowners have three roads on their property. Mr. Howard noted under #6(a) the landowner would be assessed for his own portion. This provision can be clarified. For corner lots, a landowner would have two votes and receive two assessments. A referendum only covers one road so the landowner will be voting for each individual road and assessed 100% for each.

Mr. Meyer agreed there should be a procedure to honor no-paving petitions. Mr. Powell noted this would be an "action to not do something." Mr. Hinkle noted if there is 100% agreement, a conservation easement could be established on a road. Mr. Howard noted if the bar is high enough and a fee is required to start a project, this should take care of that issue. There would be enough guidance for the Board to make a decision against paving. Ms. Eason suggested bringing petitions to the Board meetings for review prior to proceeding.

Mr. Hinkle asked for staff input as to OGEM vs. asphalt. Ms. Eason stated that OGEM is usually more efficient on short roads. In the past, if there is a change from OGEM to asphalt, a petition is resubmitted. Mr. Dillon noted that usually three miles of roadway is needed for OGEM to be efficient.

Mr. Hinkle was not in favor of providing financing, but would vote for financing with a 90% requirement, similar to the County's policy. Mr. Powell believed a lower requirement would be better. Mr. Ryan was concerned with hardship cases. Mr. Howard noted it is the Board's responsibility to look at each project and make a decision. Mr. Capko suggested a provision whereby senior citizens can get a delay in paying their taxes. He will look into this possibility and report back to the Board. Mr. Howard believed the matter of assessment should be a separate policy.

Mr. Hinkle suggested having both proposals discussed at a public hearing, as well as a no-paving policy. Mr. Capko did not think a public hearing was necessary but public comments during a regular Board meeting would be sufficient. Further discussion followed regarding the need for another public hearing. Mr. Powell excused himself from the meeting at this time due to an urgent family matter.

It was decided to present both proposals and a no-paving policy at the next Board meeting for landowner comments, and then take action at the May Board meeting. It was agreed to use the County's policy as a model. All were in agreement to add an application fee. Staff was asked to estimate the time required of them during the petition process. Mr. Meyer agreed to prepare a no-paving policy.

Ms. Eason noted the next step in the 19th Plan is a public hearing and asked for Board direction. Three consecutive weeks of advertising are required prior to a public hearing. Ms. Eason and Mr. Capko were both concerned about the 19th Plan public hearings overlapping with the policy changes being presented, creating confusion for the landowners.

Mr. Capko asked that any letters with threats of a lawsuit or bodily harm be forwarded to his office.

Mr. Hinkle asked the Board to consider a workshop meeting on water control, to be scheduled during the summer. There being no further discussion by the Board, the meeting was adjourned.

- 3. On April 1, 2017 the final payments were made on the 2004 Series B & C Notes to Wells Fargo. The final payment on the Egret Landing Refunding Note is due on August 1, 2017.
- 4. We will shortly be starting the budget process for next fiscal year, beginning Oct. 1st 2017. In that regard, early input of the thoughts of individual supervisors on new programs or changes in the scope of services will be appreciated. For administrative purposes these should go through the District Managers office. The suggestions can then be researched, followed by a presentation to the full Board.
- 5. Following the Board's direction we will be sending our report to the District's Public Information Officer for uploading to the web-site.

The following is a summary of activities and communications that were of significance during the month of February. Updated information is presented in **bold**:

I. CURRENT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER DISTRICT PROJECTS

- A. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed February 6, 2015 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by March 12, 2015. On March 26, 2015, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners who voted on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately 3.8 miles):
 - · 64th Way N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 67th Trail N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 68th Drive N. between 146th Road N. and 149th Place N.
 - 74th Avenue N. between 155th Place N. and 159th Court N.
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 - · 149th Place between 69th Drive N. and 64th Way N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 79th Terrace N.
 - 163rd Court N. between 75th Avenue N. to East End

At the May 2015 meeting, staff was directed to prepare the 18th Plan of Improvement. The public hearing for the Plan of Improvement was held on August 20, 2015. Staff was then directed to prepare the Engineer's Report. The public hearing for the Engineer's Report was held at the October 15, 2015 meeting. At the October 15, 2015 meeting, staff was directed to begin survey and design services for the approved 18th Plan of Improvement.

On May 20, 2016, an advertisement for bid on the project was published in the Palm Beach Post. Potential bidders picked up bid documents on May 27, 2016 with bids due on June 27, 2016.

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After negotiating with the lower bidder, Hardrives, Inc, contract documents were executed and a notice to proceed was issued for October 1, 2016. Staff conducted a substantial complete walk through with the contractor on April 3, 2017. Contractor is completing the punch list items. Staff is prepared to update the board at this month's meeting.

- B. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed October 17, 2016 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by December 9, 2016. On December 14, 2016, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners who voted on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately 2.2 miles)
 - 76th Trail N. between 163rd Court N. and 165th Street N.
 - · 78th Drive N. between 165th Street N. and 167th Court N.
 - 154th Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 81st Terrace N.
 - 159th Court N. between 78th Drive N. and 84th Avenue N.
 - 160th Street N. between 72nd Drive N. and 75th Avenue N. and 72nd Drive N. from 160th Street N. to 160th Lane N.
 - 175th Road N. between Jupiter Farms Road and West End

The Board requested that 76th Trail N between 160th Lane N and 162nd Court N be included into the proposed plan dependent upon the results of another verified petition process. At the February 2017 Board Meeting, staff receive approval to prepare the 19th Plan of Improvements. Staff has been working on this draft plan and is prepared to update the board at this month's meeting.

II. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

- A. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Steering Committee met on March 15, 2017. The subject of the meeting was to review the 6th Year Annual Reports and conduct a refresher training course on spill prevention and response, illicit discharge, and sedimentation and erosion control for construction sites. In addition, the committee announced upcoming training opportunities. On April 18 and 19, 2017, the Florida Stormwater Association Level 2 Stormwater Operator Training will be held in Miami-Dade County to benefit operators or project managers in the stormwater management industry. On May 23 and 24, 2017, the Stormwater, Erosion, and Sedimentation Control Inspector Training will be held at the Town of Jupiter Community Center. The next Steering Committee Meeting is scheduled for April 19, 2017. The primary purpose of this meeting is to discuss Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Prioritization Plan and Cycle 4, Year 1 Report Form.
- B. Staff has been actively involved in a sub team for modeling for the Loxahatchee River Water Restoration Plan. Staff has been meeting with the Army Corp of Engineers (ACOE) and South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) to clarify the operational protocols of South Indian River Water Management District. Efforts on the sub team include confirming assumptions in the model and aiding in the planning effort.

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In addition, a meeting was held March 30, 2016 of the Project Delivery Team. At this meeting the group reviewed 13 project alternatives and ranked the projects to reduce the number of projects that will undergo further analysis. A subsequent meeting was held on April 5, 2016 to reduce the number of alternatives to 5 alternatives. The alternatives include a variety of projects to help the Loxahatchee River to meet its goals for minimum flow and restoration.

Staff has been attending the Engineering and Modeling Task subcommittee meetings to ensure that the operational protocols are being implemented for the District. SFWMD and the ACOE have been working on updating the model with the different scenarios and updating the cost estimates of proposed regional projects for the cost feasibility analysis. These updates are being prepared for the Project Implementation Report (PIR) as part of the ACOE process. The ACOE has posted some of the preliminary results of the modeling, which did not include the SIRWCD area. The ACOE is still finalizing these results and are preparing a schedule to complete the PIR.

C. Staff attended the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council meeting on March 28, 2016. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) presented possible TMDLs within certain water body identification (WBID) areas and the process of a Reasonable Assurance plan in lieu of a TMDL and Basin Area Management Plan (BMAP) for the impaired WBIDs. As a result of this meeting, at the June 27, 2016 meeting, the council discussed plans to move forward with a Reasonable Assurance (RA) plan with the assistance of FDEP. Meetings have been held monthly to discuss the RA plan. The last meetings were September 26, 2016 and October 24, 2016 to discuss the basin delineations, water quality, and a draft RA plan. A special meeting was held on December 2, 2016 to discuss the RA boundaries on the project. Staff attended to educate the committee on the drainage system of the District.

Staff attended the March 27, 2017 meeting. This meeting discussed the WBID boundary changes, the water quality monitoring plan, and the status of the RA Plan.

- D. On April 5, 2017, staff met with Palm Beach County to discuss a proposal for the construction of a portage on Canal 14. Staff reviewed the initial request and is prepared to present the item at this month's board meeting.
- E. Staff continues to monitor and participate in the activities of the Loxahatchee River Ecosystem Management Committee, the Loxahatchee River Initiative, and the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council.
- F. We continue to receive, review, and comment on various permit applications for projects to be constructed within the District.
- G. We continue to provide engineering assistance to the General Manager, as needed, on operation and maintenance items, as well as landowner requests, utility requests, and inquiries from other governmental entities on issues that involve engineering support.

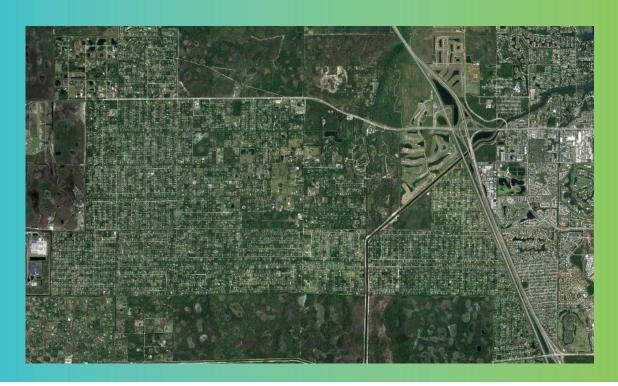

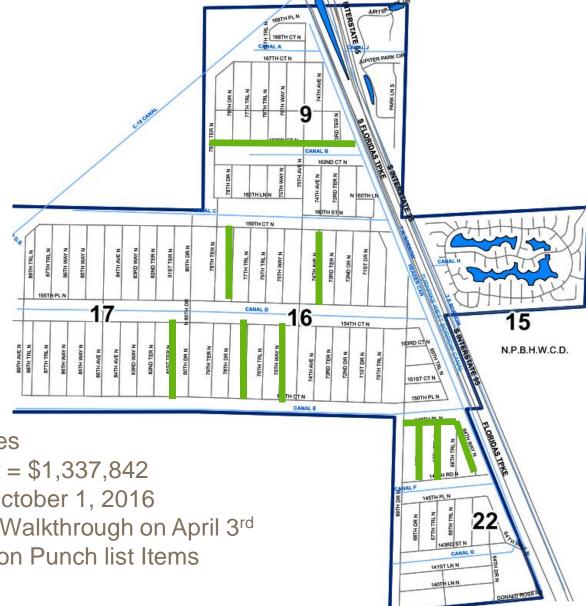

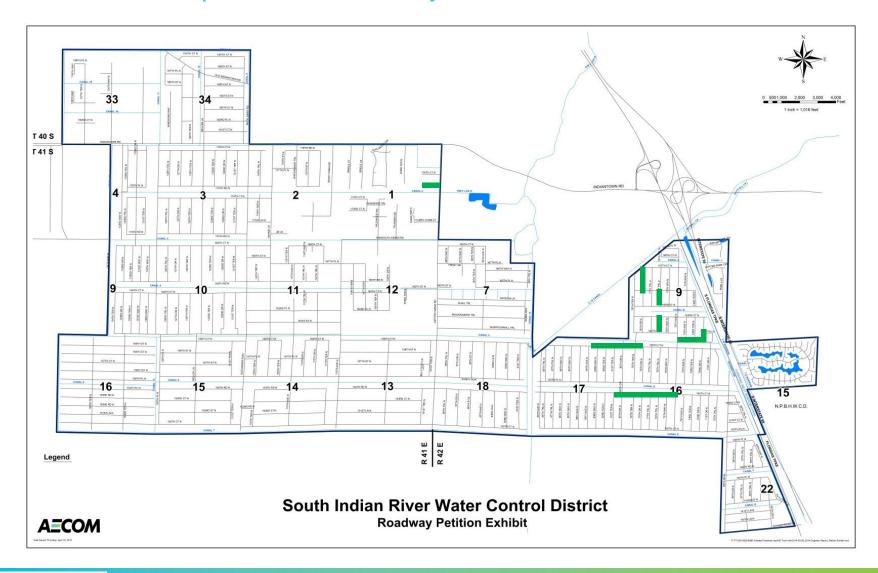

Board Meeting Date May 18, 2017

The following is a summary of activities and communications that were of significance during the month of May. Updated information is presented in **bold**:

I. CURRENT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER DISTRICT PROJECTS

- A. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed February 6, 2015 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by March 12, 2015. On March 26, 2015, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners who voted on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately 3.8 miles):
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 - 175th Road N. between Jupiter Farms Road and West End

At the February 2017 Board Meeting, staff receive approval to prepare the 19th Plan of Improvements. Staff has been working on this draft plan. A public hearing for the filing of the resolution to consider approval of an amendment to its current water control plan to include this project is being held at this month's meeting. Staff is prepared to conduct this public hearing and to update the Board on the next steps.

II. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

A. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Steering Committee met on April 19, 2017. The meeting consisted of an update on the status of the final 6th Year Annual Report and Interlocal Agreements and a discussion on the Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDL) for Lake Ida, Hillsboro Canal, and the Loxahatchee River. In addition, a presentation was given on the new Assessment Program. The current water quality monitoring program in the Cycle 3 Permit has been changed to an Assessment Program for the new Cycle 4 Permit. All permittees are required to submit a written assessment program by September 7, 2017.

On May 23 and 24, 2017, the Stormwater, Erosion, and Sedimentation Control Inspector Training will be held at the Town of Jupiter Community Center. The next Steering Committee Meeting is scheduled for May 17, 2017. The primary purpose of this meeting is to discuss the Assessment Program.

B. Staff has been actively involved in a sub team for modeling for the Loxahatchee River Water Restoration Plan. Staff has been meeting with the Army Corp of Engineers (ACOE) and South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) to clarify the operational protocols of South Indian River Water Management District. Efforts

on the sub team include confirming assumptions in the model and aiding in the planning effort.

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- C. The Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council is intiating the process with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) to prepare a Reasonable Assurance plan in lieu of a TMDL and Basin Area Management Plan (BMAP) for the impaired WBIDs within the Loxahatchee River watershed. There is no update for this month on this item. Staff has been invited to be included on a committee to review the modeling efforts for the development of the RA Plan. Staff continues to participate in meetings and committees on this subject and will update the Board as items occur.
- D. Staff continues to monitor and participate in the activities of the Loxahatchee River Ecosystem Management Committee, the Loxahatchee River Initiative, and the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council.
- E. We continue to receive, review, and comment on various permit applications for projects to be constructed within the District.
- F. We continue to provide engineering assistance to the General Manager, as needed, on operation and maintenance items, as well as landowner requests, utility requests, and inquiries from other governmental entities on issues that involve engineering support.

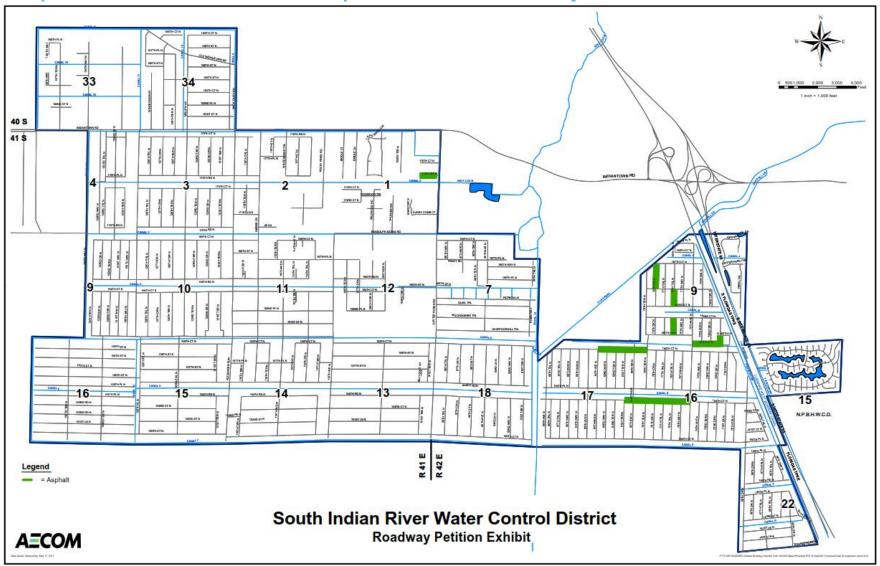

The following is a summary of activities and communications that were of significance during the month of June. Updated information is presented in **bold**:

I. CURRENT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER DISTRICT PROJECTS

- A. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed October 17, 2016 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by December 9, 2016. On December 14, 2016 and on April 14, 2017, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately 2.4 miles)
 - · 76th Trail N between 160th Lane N and 162nd Court N
 - 76th Trail N. between 163rd Court N. and 165th Street N.
 - 78th Drive N. between 165th Street N. and 167th Court N.
 - 154th Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 81st Terrace N.
 - 159th Court N. between 78th Drive N. and 84th Avenue N.
 - 160th Street N. between 72nd Drive N. and 75th Avenue N. and 72nd Drive N. from 160th Street N. to 160th Lane N.
 - 175th Road N. between Jupiter Farms Road and West End

At the February 2017 Board Meeting, staff receive approval to prepare the 19th Plan of Improvements. A public hearing for the filing of the resolution to consider approval of an amendment to its current water control plan to include this project was held on May 18, 2017. At this meeting, the board approved staff to prepare the Engineer's Report and draft Plan of Improvement. The Engineer's Report was filed on May 26, 2017. A final hearing to consider approval of the report and proposed water control plan amendment is being held at this month's meeting. Staff is prepared to conduct this public hearing and to update the Board on the next steps.

II. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

- A. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Steering Committee met on May 17, 2017 and June 21, 2017. The May meeting consisted of a presentation and discussion on the elements of an assessment program document, and the June 21, 2017 meeting consisted of results of the recent audit along with a presentation from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection on the Cycle 4 Permit Program. All permittees are required to submit a written assessment program by September 7, 2017. Staff met to discuss the details of the assessment program. The next Steering Committee Meeting is scheduled for August 16, 2017 to discuss the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Outfall Prioritization Plan and the Loxahatchee River Reasonable Assurance Plan (RAP).
- B. Staff has been actively involved in a sub team for modeling for the Loxahatchee River Water Restoration Plan. Staff has been meeting with the Army Corp of Engineers (ACOE) and South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) to clarify the operational protocols of South Indian River Water Management District. Efforts on the sub team include confirming assumptions in the model and aiding in the planning effort.

In addition, a meeting was held March 30, 2016 of the Project Delivery Team. At this meeting the group reviewed 13 project alternatives and ranked the projects to reduce the number of projects that will undergo further analysis. A subsequent meeting was held on April 5, 2016 to reduce the number of alternatives to 5 alternatives. The alternatives include a variety of projects to help the Loxahatchee River to meet its goals for minimum flow and restoration.

Staff has been attending the Engineering and Modeling Task subcommittee meetings to ensure that the operational protocols are being implemented for the District. SFWMD and the ACOE have been working on updating the model with the different scenarios and updating the cost estimates of proposed regional projects for the cost feasibility analysis. These updates are being prepared for the Project Implementation Report (PIR) as part of the ACOE process. The ACOE has posted some of the preliminary results of the modeling and staff has been reviewing and meeting with both SFWMD and ACOE on the modeling and flood protection subteams. A draft calibration report of the modeling effort has been provided for review and comment along with the results of the alternative analysis. Comments for the draft calibration report are due on May 12, 2017. Based on the initial review of the modeling, the model is being re-conceptualized to ensure that the proper inputs are in the model. Staff will continue to participate in these sub teams on behalf of the District.

The Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council is intiating the process with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) to prepare a Reasonable Assurance plan in lieu of a TMDL and Basin Area Management Plan (BMAP) for the impaired WBIDs within the Loxahatchee River watershed. Staff attended a committee meeting to review the modeling efforts for the development of the RA Plan on May 23, 2017. FDEP and stakeholders discussed the model, and staff subsequently requested for more details on the model inputs and results. As a result of the committee meeting, stakeholders attended another meeting on June 7, 2017 to discuss RAP options. Staff

continues to participate in meetings and committees on this subject and will update the Board as items occur.

- D. Staff has been working together to update the Policy and Procedure Manual. This month, staff concentrated its efforts on Chapters 1, 2, 3, 5, and 6. Staff will continue to work on this effort.
- E. Staff continues to monitor and participate in the activities of the Loxahatchee River Ecosystem Management Committee, the Loxahatchee River Initiative, and the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council.
- F. We continue to receive, review, and comment on various permit applications for projects to be constructed within the District.
- G. We continue to provide engineering assistance to the General Manager, as needed, on operation and maintenance items, as well as landowner requests, utility requests, and inquiries from other governmental entities on issues that involve engineering support.

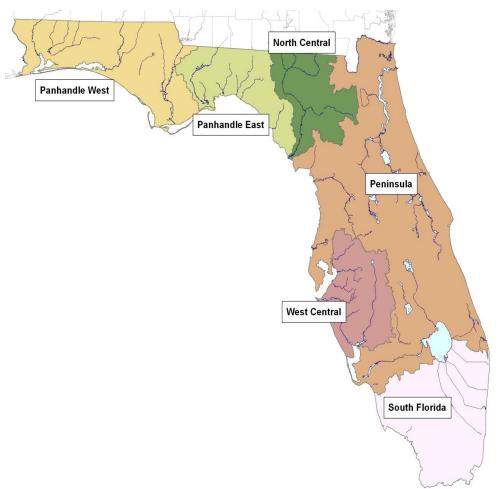

Waterbody Classification

The Clean Water Act requires that the surface waters of each state be classified according to designated uses.

- Class I Potable Water Supplies
- Class II Shellfish Propagation or Harvesting
- Class III Fish Consumption, Recreation, Propagation and Maintenance of a Healthy, Well-Balanced Population of Fish and Wildlife
- Class III Limited Fish Consumption, Recreation or Limited Recreation; and/or Propagation and Maintenance of a Limited Population of Fish and Wildlife
- Class IV Agricultural Water Supplies
- Class V Navigation, Utility and Industrial Use



Waterbody Classification - Class III - Limited

Class III – Limited – Fish Consumption, Recreation or Limited Recreation; and/or Propagation and Maintenance of a Limited Population of Fish and Wildlife

This classification is restricted to waters with human-induced physical or habitat conditions that, because of those conditions, have limited aquatic life support and habitat that prevent attainment of Class III uses.

In order to be classified as Class III – Limited, a site specific evaluation must be done and examines:

- Limited aquatic life support
- Habitat limitations
 - Physical and Hydrologic Characteristics
 - Water Management Uses



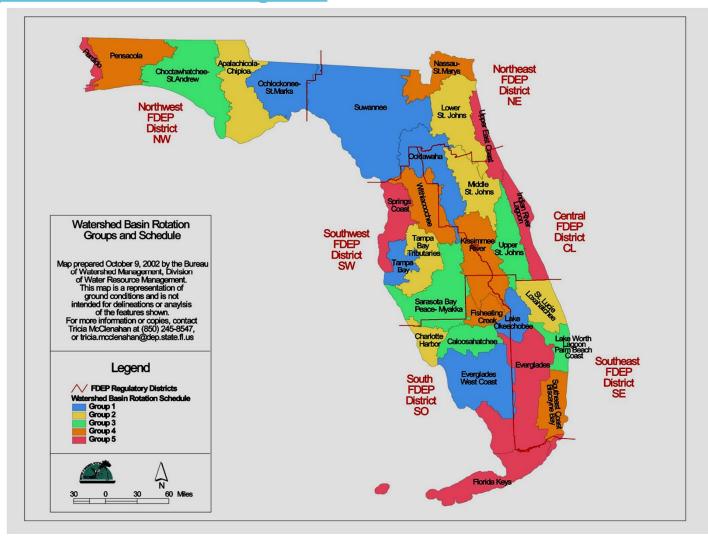
Section 303(d) of the Federal CWA requires states to:

- Submit lists of waters that do not meet applicable water quality standards, including designated uses
 - "impaired waters"
- Identify pollutant causing or expected to cause impairment
- Establish/implement TMDLs for these waters on a prioritized schedule



- DEP implements Impaired Waters assessment program as part of Watershed Management Approach
 - Started in July, 2000
 - Assessment
 - TMDL Development
 - Implementation
 - Watershed Restoration
- Watershed Approach established five-phase cycle that rotates through all basins in the state over five-year period
 - Divided state's basins into groups

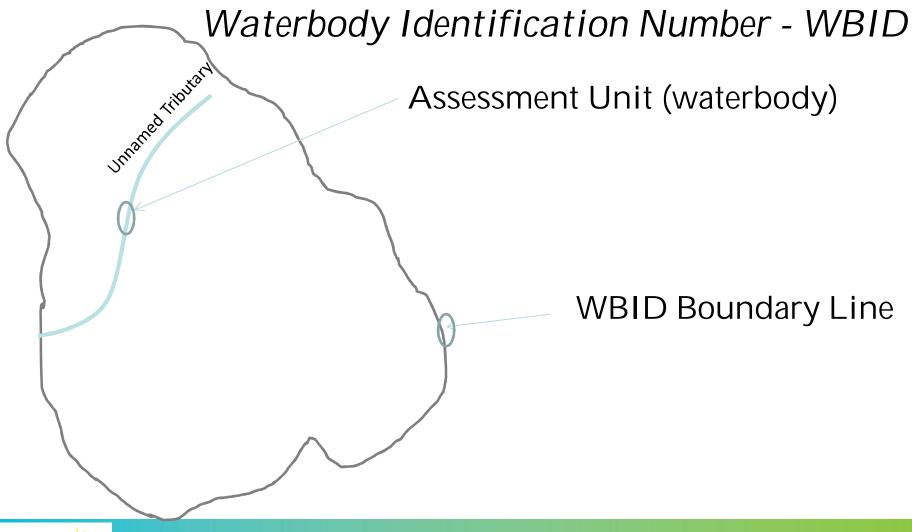

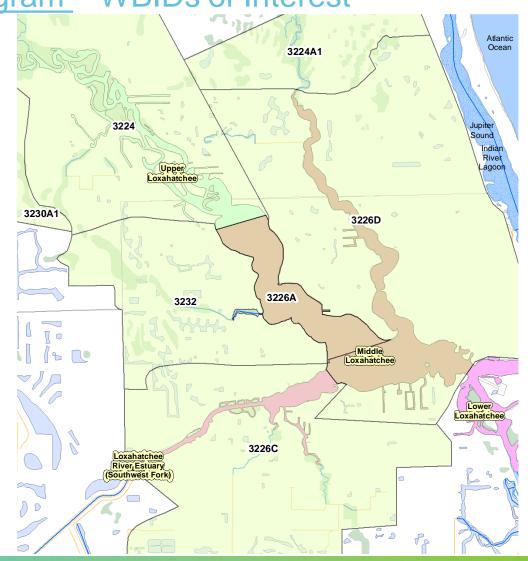
FDEP Impaired Waters Program - Assessment Units

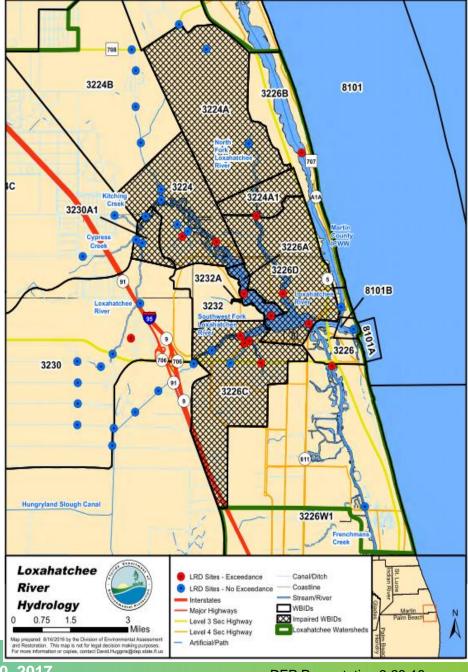

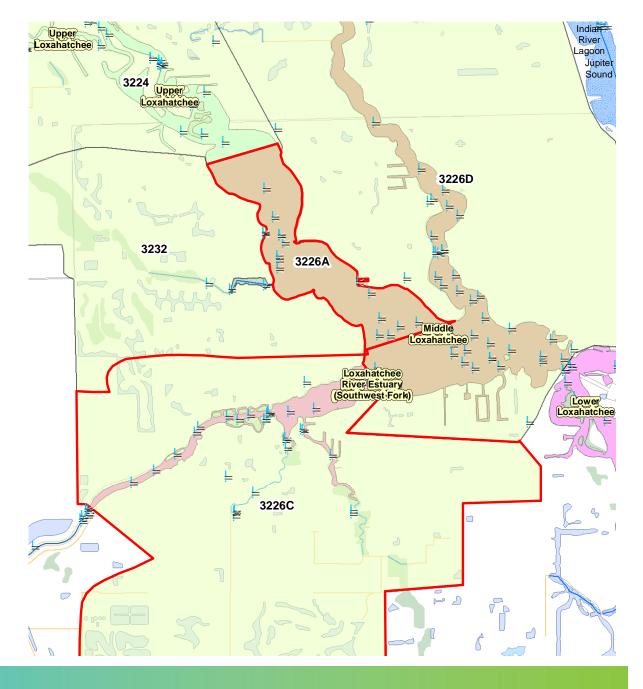

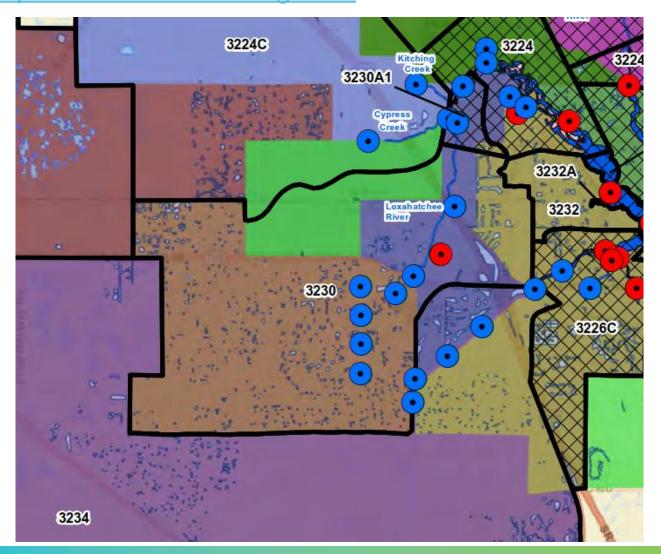


FDEP Impaired Waters Program – Sample Locations

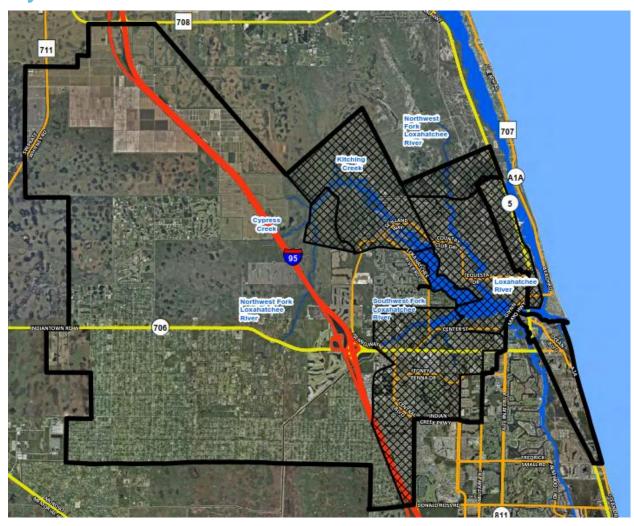

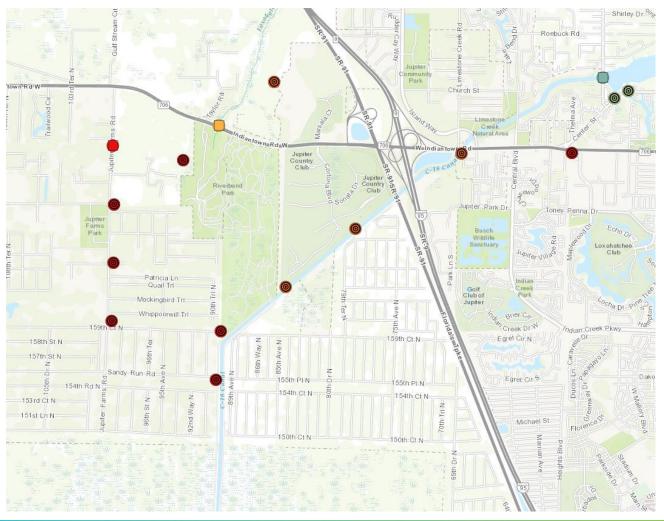

SIRWCD Water Quality Monitoring – LRD Monitoring Sites



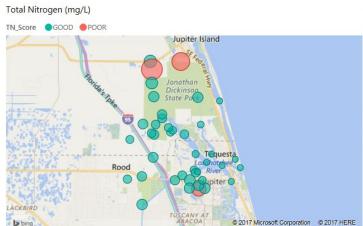


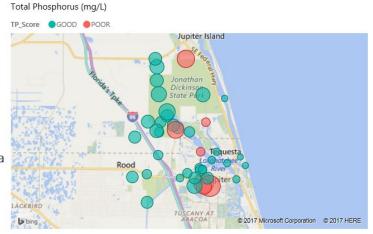
SIRWCD Water Quality Monitoring – LRD Monitoring Sites Results

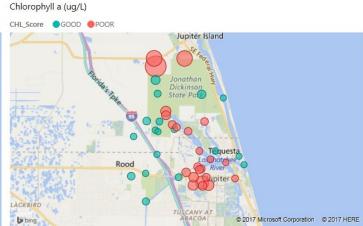


Monthly Average Stoplight Maps

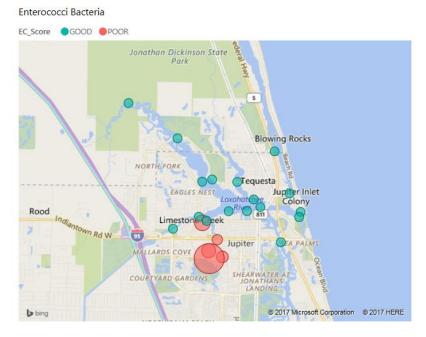

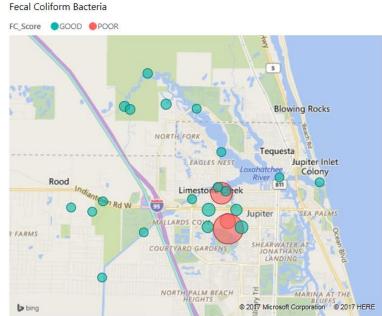

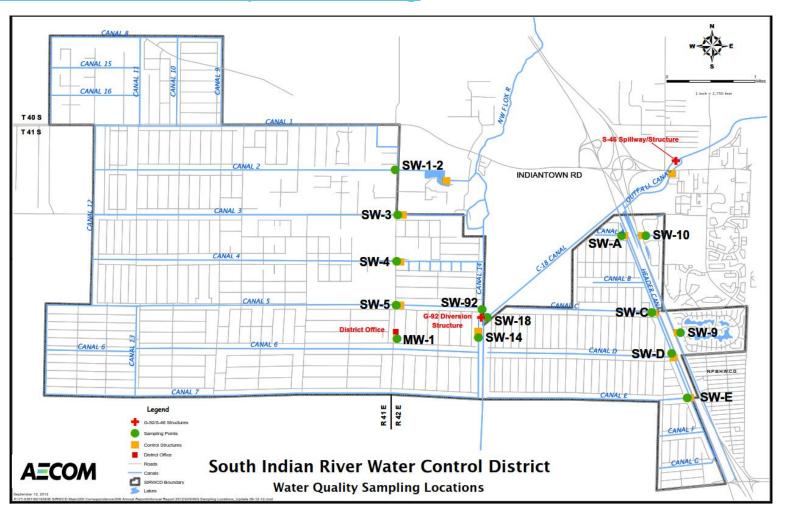

Potential SIRWCD Issues

- Preclusion of a Mixing Zone Florida Law currently precludes use of a mixing zone if the receiving water body is impaired (End-of-pipe compliance

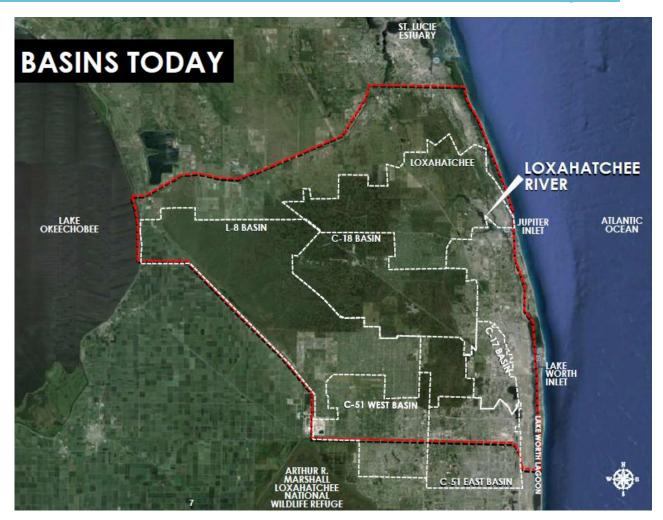


SIRWCD Path Forward in Water Quality

The following is a summary of activities and communications that were of significance during the months of July/August. Updated information is presented in **bold**:

I. CURRENT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND OTHER DISTRICT PROJECTS

- A. Pursuant to Board direction after petitioners met the minimum requirements, staff prepared a referendum for the landowner proposed project that was mailed October 17, 2016 with the request that the landowners submit their response to the District by December 9, 2016. On December 14, 2016 and on April 14, 2017, staff received the certification from the Supervisor of Elections on the results of the referendum. The majority of the landowners on the following roadways were "in favor" of the proposed project for asphalt in Palm Beach Country Estates (approximately **2.3 miles**)
 - · 76th Trail N between 160th Lane N and 162nd Court N
 - 76th Trail N. between 163rd Court N. and 165th Street N.
 - 78th Drive N. between 165th Street N. and 167th Court N.
 - 154th Court N. between 75th Avenue N. and 81st Terrace N.
 - 159th Court N. between 78th Drive N. and 83rd Way N.
 - 160th Street N. between 72nd Drive N. and 75th Avenue N. and 72nd Drive N. from 160th Street N. to 160th Lane N.
 - 175th Road N. between Jupiter Farms Road and West End

At the February 2017 Board Meeting, staff receive approval to prepare the 19th Plan of Improvements. A public hearing for the filing of the resolution to consider approval of an amendment to its current water control plan to include this project was held on May 18, 2017, and the board approved the preparation of the Engineer's Report and draft Plan of Improvement. The Engineer's Report was filed on May 26, 2017. On June 29, 2017, a final hearing was held, and the Engineer's Report and proposed water control plan amendment was approved. Staff has submitted the amendent to South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) for review and approval. Staff is prepared to update the Board at this month's meeting.

II. OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

- A. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Steering Committee met on July 10, 2017. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) presented common annual report defieciencies and the assessment program requirments, which includes water quality monitoring, pollutant loading analysis, trend evaluation, and targeted load reductions. The assessment program plan is due September 7, 2017. The next scheduled meeting is on August 16, 2017.
- B. Staff has been actively involved in a sub team for modeling for the Loxahatchee River Water Restoration Plan. Staff has been meeting with the Army Corp of Engineers (ACOE) and South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) to clarify the operational protocols of South Indian River Water Management District. Efforts on the sub team include confirming assumptions in the model and aiding in the planning effort.

In addition, a meeting was held March 30, 2016 of the Project Delivery Team. At this meeting the group reviewed 13 project alternatives and ranked the projects to reduce the number of projects that will undergo further analysis. A subsequent meeting was held on April 5, 2016 to reduce the number of alternatives to 5 alternatives. The alternatives include a variety of projects to help the Loxahatchee River to meet its goals for minimum flow and restoration.

Staff has been attending the Engineering and Modeling Task subcommittee meetings to ensure that the operational protocols are being implemented for the District. SFWMD and the ACOE have been working on updating the model with the different scenarios and updating the cost estimates of proposed regional projects for the cost feasibility analysis. These updates are being prepared for the Project Implementation Report (PIR) as part of the ACOE process. The ACOE has posted some of the preliminary results of the modeling and staff has been reviewing and meeting with both SFWMD and ACOE on the modeling and flood protection subteams. A draft calibration report of the modeling effort has been provided for review and comment along with the results of the alternative analysis. Comments for the draft calibration report were due on May 12, 2017. Based on the initial review of the modeling, the model is being re-conceptualized to ensure that the proper inputs are in the model. Staff will continue to participate in these sub teams on behalf of the District.

C. The Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council is intiating the process with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) to prepare a Reasonable Assurance plan (RAP) in lieu of a TMDL and Basin Area Management Plan (BMAP) for the impaired WBIDs within the Loxahatchee River watershed. Staff attended a committee meeting to review the modeling efforts for the development of the RAP on May 23, 2017. FDEP and stakeholders discussed the model, and staff subsequently requested for more details on the model inputs and results. As a result of the committee meeting, stakeholders attended another meeting on June 7, 2017 to discuss RAP options. The next meeting on the RAP is scheduled for August 24, 2017. Staff will continue to participate in meetings and committees on this subject and will update the Board as items occur.

AECOM

- D. Staff has been working together to update the Policy and Procedure Manual. This month, staff concentrated its efforts on Chapters 1, 2, 3, 5, and 6. Staff will continue to work on this effort.
- E. Staff continues to monitor and participate in the activities of the Loxahatchee River Ecosystem Management Committee, the Loxahatchee River Initiative, and the Loxahatchee River Management Coordinating Council.
- F. We continue to receive, review, and comment on various permit applications for projects to be constructed within the District.
- G. We continue to provide engineering assistance to the General Manager, as needed, on operation and maintenance items, as well as landowner requests, utility requests, and inquiries from other governmental entities on issues that involve engineering support.

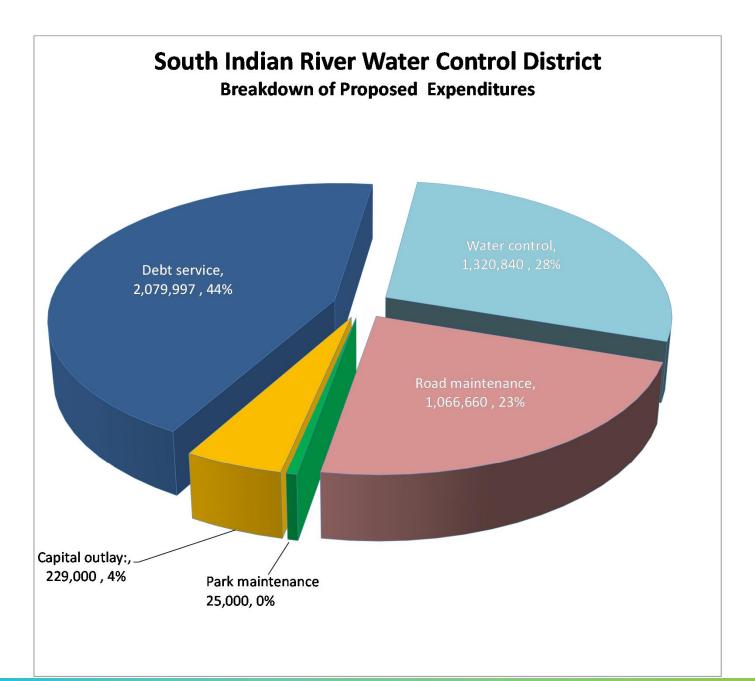

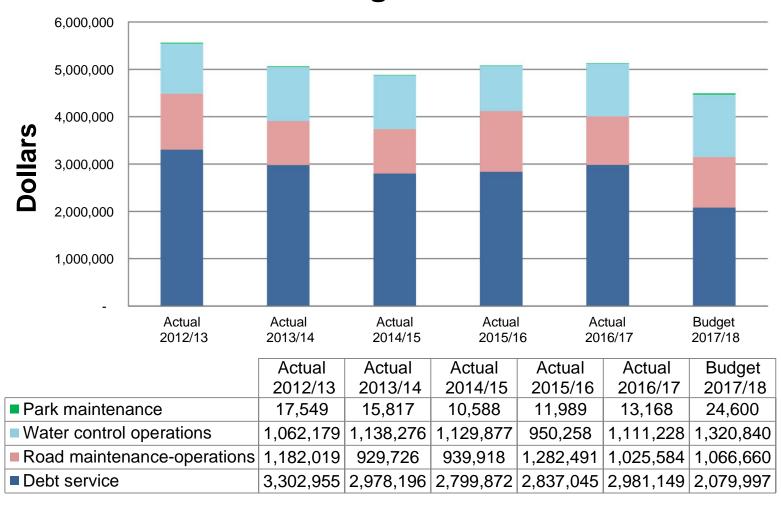

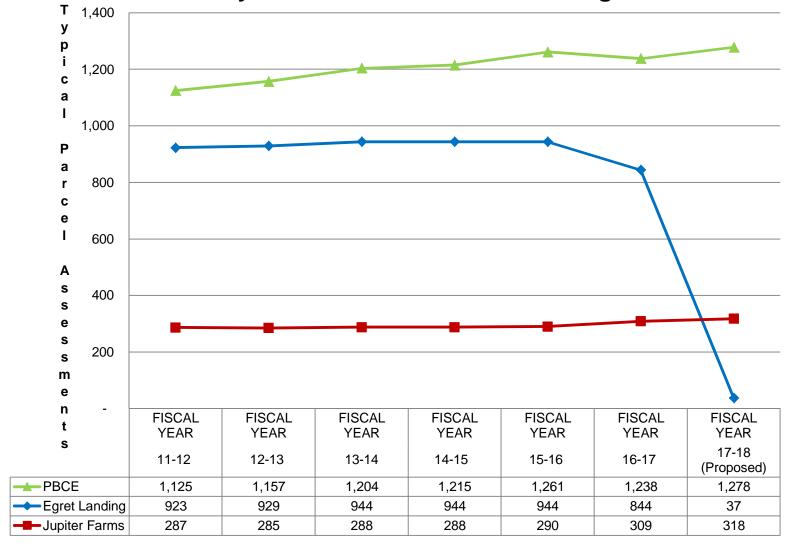
South Indian River WCD Expenditures by Programs

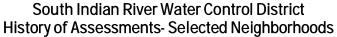


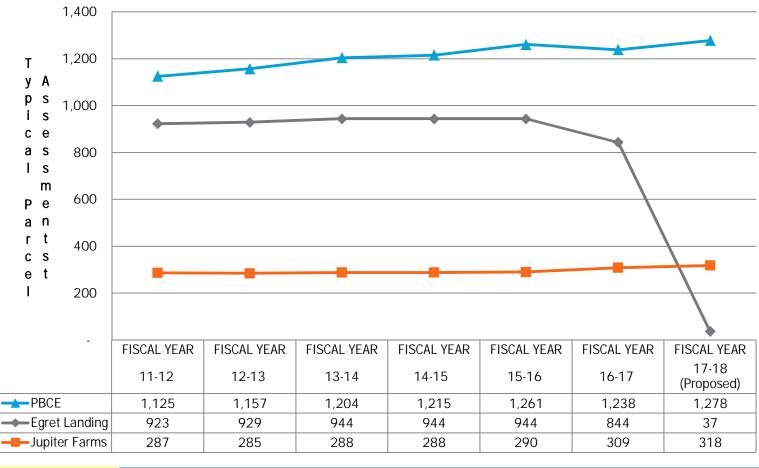
EXPENDITURE HISTORY
